Seven thousand miles from Seattle, the Cartano family was winding up the happy visit abroad in the sea coast fishing village of Wexford, a tiny hamlet in the home of the Leprechauns, famed cobblers in the land of the little folk.

"How they ever found me, I'll never know," Cartano, the Seattle attorney recalled, "but in the middle of the night I received a telephone call from Seattle.

"Ireland had put me in a mellow mood, and after all, they had gone to so much trouble to find me. And besides it was an honor to be considered for such a post.


